TAES Cochran 4-H County Programs

4-H is a community of young people across America who are learning leadership, citizenship and life skills. 4-H is about having fun, learning, exploring and discovering. In 4-H, young people make new friends, develop new skills, become leaders and help shape their communities More than 65,000 Texas youth are enrolled members of 4 -H community clubs in Texas. Another 850,000 Texas youth get involved in 4-H through special educational opportunities at school, in after school programs, or at neighborhood or youth centers. These youth live in cities, suburbs, small towns and rural communities. 4-H gives them a chance to pursue their own interests from photography to computers, from building rockets to raising sheep. A list of 4-H projects is available online. They go places - to camp, to state and national conferences. They learn to be leaders and active citizens. In 4-H clubs, they serve as officers and learn to conduct meetings, handle club funds, and facilitate group decision -making. In a growing number of communities, 4-H youth serve as youth representatives in municipal or county government or as members of Teen Courts. They give back to their communities. 4-H members get involved in volunteer projects to protect the environment, mentor younger children and help people who are less

For example, a volunteer screened any time between September 1, 2008 and August 31, 2009 needs to be re-screened at the beginning of this 2011-2012 4-H year. Health Factoid:

Nutrient Analysis

Phytonutrients are the healthprotective substances in plant foods – fruits, vegetables and grains – that promote health and help reduce risk of chronic disease.)

Walnuts contain no *trans* fat, no cholesterol and no sodium.

Walnuts are a good source of dietary fiber and protein. They are also a good source of **folic acid, vitamin B6, magnesium, phosphorus,** and **copper**. In addition, walnuts contain many antioxidants that may help protect cells from free radical damage

Walnuts are one of the best known sources of melatonin, a powerful antioxidant that is associated with reducing risk of developing Alzheimer's, Parkinson's Disease, and certain types of cancer.

Many Asian cultures believe the shape of a food is related to its health benefits. Thus, they believe the heart-shaped walnut is good for heart health. Numerous research studies have proven this is true!

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
